DESCRIPTION:

This two story adobe residence with a wood frame addition on a 21 acre parcel was built in 1884 by two Englishmen, D.B.W. Alexander and a Mr. Grundy. The Fonda del Alamo Pintado was established in 1899 by Alden M. Boyd, a pioneer grower and founder of Los Olivos. It was managed briefly by Mrs. Lorraine McMurray and then by Francis M. Shaw. Under his management, the Alamo Pintado Inn became one of the most famous resorts in California. When Shaw did not renew his lease, the Inn was operated by Mattei's Tavern as a place to house overflow guests.¹ The main house contained a sitting room, four large bedrooms, a bathroom, and an office. In an adjoining building connected to the adobe were a large dining room, two bedrooms, and a kitchen. There were also two cottages containing four bedrooms and a bath each which had been moved onto the property by one-time owner Alden Boyd. Sunny verandas and big live oak trees surrounded the buildings.²

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF SANTA BARBARA, STATE OF CALIFORNIA

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THAT RANCHO EL ALAMO PINTADO ADOBE, LOCATED SOUTH OF BALLARD IS AN HISTORICAL LANDMARK WORTHY OF PROTECTION UNDER ORDINANCE NO. 6 1716, AND DESIGNATING RANCHO EL ALAMO PINTADO ADOBE AS HISTORICAL LANDMARK NO. 12.

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RESOLUTION NO. 77-99

WHEREAS, RANCHO EL ALAMO PINTADO ADOBE, located along 10 Alamo Pintado Road, south of Ballard, has an historical interest 11 to the general public as a landmark in Santa Barbara County; and 12 WHEREAS, on January 13, 1977, the Santa Barbara County 13 Historical Landmark Advisory Committee declared Rancho El Alamo 14 15 Pintado Adobe to be an historical landmark pursuant to the provisions of Ordinance No. 1716 of the County of Santa Barbara; 16 17 and WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of the County of 18

Santa Barbara deems Rancho El Alamo Pintado Adobe to be worthy 19 20 of protection and preservation as such historical landmark; 21 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

22 1. The Board of Supervisors, having duly set a public 23 hearing for February 22, 1977, has heard all interested parties. 24 and has closed said public hearing.

25 2. The Board of Supervisors hereby declares Rancho El 26 Alamo Pintado Adobe to be Historical Landmark No. 12, pursuant to 27 Ordinance No. 1716 of the County of Santa Barbara.


"The First Guest Ranch in the Santa Ynez Valley"

The Rideau Vineyard with its graceful California Oaks and beautiful sweeping valley views is home to the historic Alamo Pintado Adobe, originally a very popular guest ranch on the once famous stage coach route that ran from Santa Ynez to Santa Barbara.

After a succession of

landowners in the late 1800s, two English remittance men purchased the land and built the two-story adobe in 1884.

The property evolved into a peaceful and beautiful guest ranch owned by A. M. Boyd who also owned the Los Olivos Ranch. Boyd's property at Los Olivos was the center of social and intellectual gatherings in the Santa Ynez Valley. The property became known as the



El Alamo Pintado Inn, or "painted cottonwood" and was so called because of a tree painted with Indian symbols that was present on the land at that time.

In the early 1900s the Adobe with its four bedrooms, dining room and sunny verandas as well as four outer cottages became a famous resort. The rates in 1910 were from \$2.50 per day and \$12-15 per week. The Inn became very chic and attracted many notables. Guests enjoyed exquisite dinners in the Adobe and lemonade on the veranda overlooking the lilacs in the spring and golden yellow cottonwoods in the fall.

As years went by, the Adobe found itself barely surviving as a working ranch. In the late 1900s, the property

was abandoned until Iris Rideau purchased it in August, 1996 with a vision to rescue the once famous inn. From weeds, peeling paint and collapsed structures the Adobe has once again become a place of old-fashioned beauty; it is truly a place that makes you feel as though you are coming home.

1843	The name Alamo Pintado comes from a giant Cottonwood painted with Indian symbols and becomes one of the many stories about the origin of the name.
1852	Granted to Caesar Latailfade, a Frenchman, but grant revoked in 1857
1857	Homesteaded by Englishman George Lewis , founder of the town of Ballard
1833	Property planted as a vineyard with five grape varieties including Grenache
3834	Two-story English-style adobe built by English remittance men, Daniel B. W. Alexander and Fred Grundy on 160 acre ranch
1887	Pacific Coast Railway arrives in Los Olivos.
1839	Road built from Mission Santa Inés to Ballard
1589	100 acres planted with 6,000 peach, 4,000 prune trees
1890	Property sold to French Countess who in turn sells to Mr. Boyd. Adobe becomes a center for valley intellectual and social gatherings.
1899	Boyd establishes La Fonda (Inn) del Alanto Pintado moving four cottages to the property.
01910	Alamo Pintado Inn operated by Matter's to accommodate 'extra' guests
1937	Sam de la Cuesta purchases the property and runs it as ranch only.
1978	El Alarno Pintado Adolse dedicated as County Historical Monument ≇12 on October 30.
1996	Iris Rideau purchases the El Alamo Pintado Adobe, aban- doned after successive owners including King and Elenita Merrill.
1997	Restoration of Adobe and construction of Rideau Vineyard winery is begun.
3998	El Alarno Pintado Adobe restored to its original European heritage.
6661	Ten acres of Rhône varietals will be planted in the Spring.
