ATHLETIC RECORD

- September 28—Led by Co-Captains, Angelo Mantenuto and Johnny Oates, the Watertown football machine opened its season by defeating Framingham 6-0.
- October 4—Playing a team of supposedly much greater power, Lowell, the local eleven allowed its opponents only one touchdown. The play of the line, especially of Ernest Reiman, was outstanding.
- October 4—In one of the best games of their year, the Watertown soccerites shut out Medford 1–0. The lone tally was made by Leedham.
- October 8—The girls' field hockey team opened its season by defeating Winthrop 4-0. Captain Dot Gough and Jean Platt starred.
- October 11—The soccer team, displaying the effects of the able coaching of Mr. Craig, outbooted Malden 4-0. Sexton, a middler, showed great promise in this game by scoring several remarkable goals.
- October 12—The Watertown gridsters were drubbed by Winthrop 27–0. As in the previous game the stellar efforts of the line, led by Bob Chaisson, were offset by faulty backfield play.


