Medicare is the federal health insurance program for people aged 65 and older. Medicare is divided into two parts: Part A - Hospital insurance which covers hospital costs, (after a deductible) some skilled nursing care, and home health visits, and Part B, which covers 80% of certain other medical fees (after a deductible). Part B is voluntary and requires payment of a premium that is usually deducted from your Social Security check each month. Seniors usually supplement Medicare coverage with additional insurance purchased individually through 'medigap' or HMO policies (listed below). "The Medicare Handbook" outlines the most current information about coverage and may be obtained by calling Social Security www.ssa.gov at 1-800-772-1213.

Prescription Advantage is a prescription drug insurance program for all Massachusetts residents age 65 and older. The program was created by the Commonwealth, and is administered by the Mass Executive Office of Elder Affairs. A maximum out-of-pocket ceiling exists for all income levels. Medicare has endorsed prescription drug discount cards that provide, on average, a 10-15% discount off the price of your prescriptions drugs. Card sponsors offer special pricing on a list of drugs they cover, provide access to an extensive retail pharmacy network, operate call centers, and have a process to respond to beneficiary concerns. These issues are particularly prevalent when Medicare participants are within the coverage gap (donut hole). This is the period of time after Medicare and the participant jointly pay \$3,700 a year (2017) on prescription-related costs. The donut hole includes copays, deductibles and the cost of the drugs.

Mass Medline, known as the Pharmacy Outreach Program, is a free program to assist Massachusetts residents in obtaining affordable prescription drugs and information about their medications. The program is funded by the State and administered through the Mass Executive Office of Elder Affairs.

Manufacturer Discount Card Programs

Discount Cards - Some companies offer discount cards to people within certain income ranges. The cards tell the local pharmacist to give that customer a discount for that company's drugs only. There are many different cards offering an array of discounts and having distinct eligibility guidelines making it difficult to decide which card is right for you. Income eligibility guidelines generally restrict individuals whose incomes are higher than \$30,000/\$40,000 for an individual/couple.

SENIOR HOME CARE SERVICES

Many services are geared toward seniors who wish to remain in their own homes for as long as possible. The Massachusetts Home Care Program administered locally by Springwell provides state subsidized support services to income eligible elders with daily living needs.

Springwell is the Aging Services Access Point (ASAP) and Area Agency on Aging (AAA) for Watertown and surrounding communities and coordinates services for elders including: case management, placing home health aides and homemakers, Meals on Wheels and congregate meal programs, respite services, and some financial assistance for adult day health care. Eligibility is based on need and income. Fees are determined on a sliding scale. Caregiver support resources are available regardless of income. Seniors ineligible for funding or subsidy are referred to local home health/homemaker agencies for private pay.

The Massachusetts Family Caregiver Support Program administered through Springwell, provides free services such as an in-home assessment, information and referral, education, and training for spouses, family members and friends who care for an elder.

A Program of All-inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE)

PACE provides comprehensive medical and social services to certain frail, elderly people (participants) still living in the community. HOME HEALTH CARE

Home health agencies today provide a full range of health and supportive services which may include skilled nursing, home health aides, homemaker/housekeeping, social services, physical, occupational, and speech therapy, emergency response, nutrition counseling, and case management. For individuals who need assistance with certain activities of daily living, such as bathing, dressing,

grooming, and getting in and out of bed, home health agencies can provide home health aides or personal care homemakers.

ASSISTED LIVING

Assisted Living is a residential setting that offers choices in personal care and health related services designed for seniors who need regular help with daily activities (bathing, dressing, toileting, walking, and medication reminders) but who do not need a nursing care facility. Such facilities offer a custodial level of care for seniors with some functional impairments, either physical or cognitive. Each residential unit has an emergency call system supported by 24-hour security and staff availability. These facilities may also offer three meals a day served in a dining room, housekeeping transportation, health promotion and exercise programs, medication management, personal laundry services, and social and recreational activities.

ADULT DAY HEALTH CARE

Facilities that provide community-based day health care in a safe environment to individuals with a variety of cognitive and functional limitations who do not require 24hour institutional care, yet are not capable of full-time,

independent living. They are designed to assist the individual obtain his/her maximum level of health, prevent further disabilities, and provide respite for family members/caregivers.

CONGREGATE HOUSING

Congregate Housing is a shared living environment designed to integrate the housing and service needs of income eligible elders and younger disabled individuals. Residents have their own room, and share the common areas of a house. Individuals in need of 24-hour supervision are not appropriate for congregate housing. Locally, there are two sites managed by Newton and Waltham Housing Authorities in conjunction with Springwell. Springwell coordinates support services and placement for elder residents.
